Tree Planting Ceremony Opens International Forest Research Conference

A tree planting ceremony was held Sunday afternoon to commemorate the 24th IUFRO World Congress. In keeping with IUFRO tradition, four trees were planted as a gift to the host city during the ceremony: Cedar of Lebanon, Pinyon pine, American chestnut, and European beech.

The ceremony was held in the Salt Lake City International Peace Gardens, located at 1000 South 900 West, Salt Lake City, Utah. Developed in 1947 and maintained by the Salt Lake City Parks Department, the Peace Gardens represent 28 countries. The ceremony took place in the Lebanese section of the garden.

Niels Elers Koch, IUFRO President, was on hand to present the trees to Salt Lake City. Robert Bonnie, USDA Under Secretary for Natural Resources and the Environment, and U.S. Forest Service Chief, Thomas Tidwell, also offered remarks on the importance of forest research and the international exchange of knowledge. Brian Cottam, Utah State Forester, and Todd Reese, Salt Lake City Parks and Public Lands Program Director, accepted the trees, welcomed the conference attendees, and invited everyone to enjoy the beauty of Utah this week.

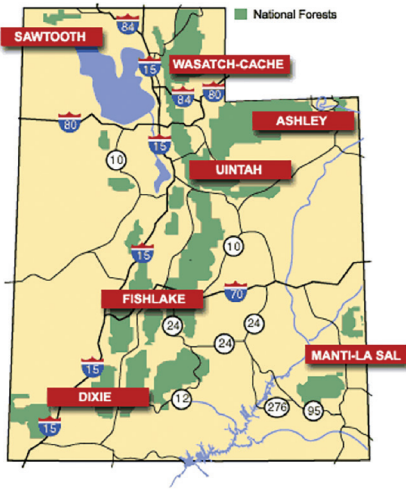

Welcome to the National Forests of Utah



National forest land covers about 15% of the state of Utah for a total of 9 million acres. Most of this area is in the central mountains that stretch from Dixie in the south through Fishlake and Uintah in central Utah, all the way to the northern Wasatch-Cache and Ashley on the northern border; also included are two smaller ranges in the southeast (the Manti-La Sal Mountains), and portions of Idaho’s Sawtooth, in the northwest.

Getting around Salt Lake City

TRAX, the urban surface rail system, has a “fare free” zone in the downtown urban area. You can get on and get off the TRAX trolleys without buying a ticket within this zone. Beyond the “fare free” zone, tickets are needed. TRAX serves several downtown-shopping areas.

The TRAX line also runs to and from the Salt Lake City International Airport. Board the Blue Line train. The fare is \$2.50 USD, one way.

Andy Buchanan: Modern Timber Buildings for Sustainable Forests

Dr. Andy Buchanan is Professor of Timber Design at the University of Canterbury, New Zealand. He is a structural engineer with a broad range of interests in timber engineering, sustainability, fire safety, and earthquake engineering. He has led the development of post-tensioned timber for multi-story buildings.

This session covers the huge opportunities for engineered wood to be used for constructing modern timber buildings. This is essential for a greener future on our planet, to reduce world-wide dependence on energy and CO2 intensive materials like concrete and steel by moving to engineered wood to construct homes, factories and offices for growing populations.

Research and Communication Skills Honed at Pre-Congress Training

Clouds, snow, and finally sun greeted 69 participants of the Pre-Congress Training Session as they practiced their skills in research methods and communicating forest science at the Snowbird Resort in Utah on September 29 to October 2. Participants traveled from 30 countries to attend the five-day session sponsored by IUFRO Special Program for Developing Capacities (SPDC).

“In a friendly and positive atmosphere, this training enhanced the competence of participants in research methods and communications – where science interacts with society at large,” said Michael Kleine, Director of IUFRO-SPDC.

The research methods session provided a framework for preparing a research study plan. Rolfe Leary, retired U.S. Forest Service, USA, and John Kershaw, University of New Brunswick, served as trainers in helping participants ask scientific questions, develop hypotheses, and design research approaches.

In the communications session, Cindy Miner, U.S. Forest Service, USA, provided communication theory and concepts and coached participants in writing communication strategies, press releases, and blogs, and also interviewing with the media. Michael Kleine and Bastiaan Louman, CATIE, Costa Rica, focused this session on making science relevant to policy makers and resource managers.

The last day, participants learned about the Global Forest information System (GFIS) and its application in their work. Eero Mikkola and Juha Hautagangas, Finland described the capabilities of this system.



Social Media Training

The #IUFRO2014 Social Media Workshop took place yesterday bringing together delegates interested in learning how to promote forest science online. The training introduced those in attendance to the cornerstones of building a social media strategy, the tools and best practices used in modern day communications, as well as how to interview a scientist and the art of blog writing.
